

The New Normal

As I mentioned last month, we are finally opening up events again. We are continuing with the *Crawl, Walk, Run* method. In events that are running now there are clearly marked people serving as *Health Monitors* to make sure that we are all behaving properly to comply with County,

State, and CDC guidelines to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Crawl – Events on the calendar that are labeled with the location and *Members Only* in square brackets i.e., [150 – Members Only] are in the first stage of the reopening process. At this stage, the shoot chair has filled out the required County of San Diego Reopening Plan form and has adjusted their event and sign-up process to accommodate the County's COVID requirements. This is quickly voted on by the Board of Directors and once it is approved, the event can open. At this stage, it is limited to EF&GA Members Only. This is done to keep the participant list short so that the shoot chair can fine-tune the sign-in process and the running of the event.

Walk - Events on the calendar that are labeled with the location and Members & IG in square brackets i.e., [150 – Members & IG] are in the second stage of the reopening process. At this stage, the shoot chair has been running the event in the Crawl (members-only) stage and has decided that the process has been tuned and is working well. At this stage, the shoot chair adjusts the County of San Diego form and submits the declaration to the Board for approval. This is quickly voted on by the Board of Directors and once it is approved, the event can open in Walk mode. At this stage, it is limited to EF&GA Members and Invited Guests. Just like with ca1sual shooting, each EF&GA member may invite up to two (2) guests to an event. As a courtesy to the shoot chair, please inform the shoot chair of the guests that you intend to bring to the event. Just like casual shooting, you are responsible for getting your guests through the gate and making sure that they follow EF&GA rules of safety, conduct, and COVID compliance. These tiered levels of responsibility will ease the burden on the shoot chair and make the event run smoother.

Run – This will be in the state of *back to normal*. When this stage is achieved for an event, the shoot chair will be permitted to set the gate to OPEN during the event and the general public will be able to participate in the event. This stage will be under consideration when the State of California has declared San Diego County with a risk status of *Minimal*. At the time of this writing, San Diego County currently has a Risk Status of *Moderate*.

All of this is subject to change because the State of California and the County of San Diego are constantly changing the rules and requirements. If this were a football game, it would be like having the referees move the goalposts after each play and at the same time having the line umpires adjusting the boundary lines after every 3 minutes of play.

One thing that has not changed is the tireless dedication and efforts from the shoot chairs and the others that help run each event. Under normal conditions, running an event is like herding cats on horseback. Adding this level of complexity is like handing that cowboy two full glasses of water and asking him not to spill them while riding bareback without a bridle. Please be sure to thank your shoot chairs for their patience, dedication, and commitment to excellence.

Engineering and Hard Work

Over the past few years Patrick Russ, Chris Cote, and I have been working on inventing ways to more efficiently separate the lead from the dirt at the back of the Pistol Range.

The first device was a dry-sluice that consisted of a 2x6 wooden frame with a wire mesh bottom hanging from a wooden structure that would swing with percussion to shake the mix traveling downhill while dirt falls through. The lead would fall out the end of frame into a 5-gallon bucket that we would stack in the back of a Gator to be dumped into the recycling vats later. This worked but it took about 10 people all day to fill a 1/2 yard vat with lead. We used rakes and shovels to remove the pay-dirt from the hill and multiple people would pick out the rocks while mix was moving down the frame. The work was dirty and slow but it did produce results.

The second device started out as a cement mixer with an expanded steel trash can bolted to the front of it. While the mixer was rotating, we would shovel in pay-dirt and the tumbling action would separate the dirt from the lead. This was faster and more effective but it still require a bunch of people to separate the rocks from the lead. With about 6 people, we could fill a ½ yard vat with lead in about 6 hours. Again the work was dirty and difficult but it did produce results with fewer people and in less time.

Enter Dave Robertson. Dave is a quiet guy with a great sense of humor and a heck of Trap and 5-Stand shooter. If you have been to a work party, you have probably seen him driving his orange tractor for the entire day. He looked at what we had done and decided that it could be done bigger, faster, and better. He fabricated a trommel that is about 12 feet long with a cylinder made from a 55-gallon drum and expanded steel. The trommel is powered by two hydraulic motors driven by a hydraulic pump from the PTO on his tractor. He also fabricated a hopper (known as the 'hoppah') that can be loaded with a skip loader. The 'hoppah' is then picked up with a forklift to pour the pay-dirt into the uphill end of the trommel. Once we tested the system (hoppah and trommel together), we made a plan to do the lead mining in a big way.

First, we filled sand bags. Not just a few, about 1500 of them. We used the 'hoppah' to fill sand bags while at least two other people used zip-ties to close the sandbags. The filled sandbags were then shuttled over to the Pistol Range using a tractor bucket and/or both of the Gators.

An excavator was rented and about 80 cubic yards of pay-dirt was removed from the back of the Pistol Range. Fee Builders Supply donated 20 cubic yards of DG (Decomposed Granite) to combine with the sandbags to fill in the hill again while mitigating erosion.

On August 16th, we had a work party. We started processing the paydirt through the 'hoppah' into the trommel. It was hot, humid, and uncomfortable outside but we processed about 50-60 cubic yards of material. The dirt that was separated from the lead was put up on the hill with tractors along with layers of sandbags and DG. We filled a

InterClub (8/22/2020)

This time it was our turn to host the InterClub Trap Competition and I went into it expecting a hot-mess all day long. Under normal (non-COVID) conditions this event is a lot of work with a bunch of little details all over the place combined with a good-sized crowd. Adding in the COVID component was going to make it just that much more challenging. Because of the nature of the event, I had two Health Safety Monitors walking around all day keeping everyone in compliance. I had volunteers offering to help with scoring and loading of the houses to help it all flow smoothly. I also had Tim Hoy, Mark Baldwin, Chris Cote, Austin Cote, and Ron Schroder step up to the plate and help orchestrate everything. Without this team, I would probably be in a padded room in a fetal position muttering incoherently right now. We set up an assembly line on the stage for getting people through the gauntlet of the Green-Sheet, Statement of Health Forms, Temperature Scanning, Payment Processing, and Squad Assignments. After everyone was checked in and rostered, we had a great safety briefing where I pointed out the Health Safety Monitors and advised the participants to please comply with our Safety and COVID requirements and procedures.

Next came the actual shooting. We ran 14 squads through two rounds of Trap from the 16-yard line on House 1 and House 2. The participants had to be reminded to 'mask-up' while walking but overall, it went smoothly.

Then, we got lunch going. Major Market supplied their usual fantastic sandwiches while our volunteers served the participants. In order to comply with COVID requirements, we had to serve the food to each participant in a sterile manner (gloves, tongs, masks, etc.,) rather than letting them all paw through the food buffet-style. While all of this was going on, we set up the Handicap squads and randomized the order per the InterClub standard method. Special thanks goes to Ken Jossenberger for doing a fantastic job creating an elegant and useful Excel spreadsheet to do the heavy lifting.

After that, we shot our handicap rounds. Another 14 squads through House 1 and House 2 at handicap distances derived from each shooter's 16-yard scores. Again, we had plenty of volunteers helping to keep score, load the machines. The participants all had a great time and the day ended without any major incidents.

As far as the scores are concerned, Redlands Shooting Park had the team high score of 463. The individual category winners were:

RANGEMASTER SOUND OFF

I would like to welcome all the new members that have recently joined EFG&A and remind all the current members to help the "newbies" learn our rules and range etiquette.

New members: We are all Range Safety Officers. If you observe unsafe firearms handling by anyone please contact an RSO on the range or contact (email/call) me with the details.

It is amazing and sometimes disheartening on some of the items that get left at the range. We do have a Lost-n-Found in the Meeting Hall. It depends on who found it (member or RSO) on where it may wind up.

If something is found on the range and it is not "valuable" it is usually put on the tables in the Meeting Hall. If the item was turned into an RSO and it has some value, we will secure it in the lockers by the fireplace in the club house. You will need to see an RSO to retrieve it.

Every 30 days or so I will go through the items found and salvage anything worth keeping. I have enough staplers to last a lifetime! I currently have a nice spotting scope that will be mine in a few weeks... Label your gear, better yet, stop leaving it!

The one item that gets left at the range that will really get my attention is firearms. It does not happen that often, but it does happen. What is even more amazing is on occasion we have to hunt you down (green sheets) and let you know we have it. You did not even know it was missing (responsibility)!!!

When a firearm is found it is secured by a staff member and I usually will take possession (which I do NOT like to do) until the owner can be found. I then like to have a nice long talk about firearms responsibility and the Felony charge you just missed getting for leaving an unattended firearm (ramifications of unauthorized use).

Just a reminder – YOU are legally responsible for your firearms! If you are going to leave a firearm on the range, please be considerate and make it a Cowboy Pistol or Rifle (45 Colt)! Organized shoots have started up again, and I *encourage*

you to check the website (not the newsletter) on what ranges or shoots are open BEFORE coming to shoot. Shoot Chairs have to go through a vetting process for COVID compliance before their shoot is approved. The Newsletter calendar may not be accurate until things get back to "normal".

As you may have noticed there has been a bit of civil unrest going on around our country which has caused a sizable increase in firearms purchases. There is now a very large group of first time gun owners who need our help.

If you know of a new firearms owner (friend, family, co-worker) invite them to the range. Encourage them to get training (we have a lot of classes). Help them get a positive experience and knowledge so that they will become responsible gun owners.

I am happy to assist anyone out there.

RULES TO LIVE BY

- **2. Never** point your firearm at anything you don't intend to shoot
- **3. Keep** your finger straight and off the trigger until you intend to fire
- **4. Know** your target and the surroundings

As we all know, thanks to Covid 19, there has not been a lot going on at the range. Most events have been completely canceled until further notice, including the Junior Program. But that does not mean that some of our Junior Coaches have not been actively improving the range.

In mid-August, a few of the adults got together to excavate the hillside on the pistol range. We took about 100 yds of dirt off the hillside in order to separate the lead out and rebuild the hillside. The lead separation is still on going as it is a huge undertaking, especially in the heat and humidity. In preparation for rebuilding the hillside, we had to fill approximately 1500 sandbags. We filled the sandbags after work and on Sundays. It was a lot of heavy, dirty work. Each time we did this, we were joined by a young man named Austin Cote. This young man is probably the hardest working 15 yr old that I have ever met. Forget that, he is easily one of the hardest working people that I know. He never complains, he's always happy to help wherever needed, and he is there voluntarily. Absolutely no one makes him be there. The Junior Marksmanship program and the Junior Coaches program are proud to count him among our ranks. If you haven't figured it out yet, this is what a future leader looks like.

No Illegal Transactions may be advertised in this newsletter. It is now illegal to sell ammunition in California without either going through an FFL or a licensed ammunition reseller. EF&GA cannot facilitate any illegal commerce of a state regulated commodity. This is also why firearm sales should include a phrase similar to Buyer pays DROS when advertising the sale of a firearm.

It may sound obvious but requests for classifieds are frequently received with not enough information to be useful to a reader.

There are 5 main components of a classified ad:

Category – Most classifieds fall into one of 3 categories, 'For Sale', 'Wanted', or 'Lost & Found'.

Subject/Title – This will appear in bold in the advertisement. This should be short (2 or 3 words) and concise.

Description – This is the body of the advertisement and can be a few sentences but not more than a paragraph. Abbreviations appear cryptic and are not recommended unless they are well known acronyms.

Price – A specific dollar amount as well as qualifiers give the reader important information. For example, "\$600 or Best Offer, Buyer pays DROS, Will consider trades"

Contact Info – This should be a name AND a phone number (including area code) and/or an e-mail address.


